



Fiscal Year 2022 Federal Appropriations Requests

APPROPRIATE FUNDING FOR ALL “WELL-ROUNDED” PROGRAMS: The Every Student Succeeds Act’s (ESSA) enumeration of “music” as part of a “Well-Rounded Education” provides opportunities for increasing access to music education for students at the state and local levels. This includes music’s eligibility for Title I, Title II, and Title IV funding. In order to make these opportunities a reality for students, Congress must follow ESSA’s intent and ensure states, districts, charters, and local schools have the most flexibility to spend their federal dollars where needed. Robust funding for all well-rounded programs, including Title IV, Part A, must be a priority to protect this flexibility.

- **Support Access to Music Education as Part of a “Well-Rounded Education” by Fully Funding Title IV, Part A:** Under Title IV, Part A of ESSA, the Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE) Grants provide a clear intent to support the nation’s schools through a “Well-Rounded Education.” As such, this new formula-funded block grant may be used to improve access to music education, and in turn, to support not only student success, but also the promotion of constructive student engagement, problem solving, and conflict resolution. In addition, the funds may be used to offer a broad array of enriched educational experiences, such as providing music to underrepresented, disadvantaged, and minority student populations.

FY 2021 Reaction

The National Association for Music Education (NAfME) supported Congress’ FY 2021 bipartisan appropriations bill for Education, which provided \$1.22 billion for the Title IV-A block grant. This figure is a slight increase from the FY20 funding level and continues to move us closer to fully funding Title IV, Part A as authorized in ESSA. This is the fourth straight year Title IV-A received a funding increase, despite its proposed elimination in each of the Trump Administration’s budget requests.

Still, since the passage of ESSA, achieving full funding for Title IV-A has remained as NAFME’s top appropriations priority. The results in funding Title IV, Part A at higher levels have been increased opportunities in music and the arts throughout the country, including the purchasing of instruments to rebuild band programs in Dayton, OH,

refurbishing of older facilities in rural Winchester, KY, and providing additional instruments for students who were unable to rent or buy in Roanoke, VA. We thank Congress for this outstanding support and continue to urge full funding of the SSAE block grant, so that every student has access to a well-rounded education, including a robust music education.

- **Support Access to Music Education for the Most Disadvantaged Students by Fully Funding Title I, Part A:** Title I, Part A programs, both school-wide and targeted, can provide supplemental funds for a “Well-Rounded Education,” including music.
